In 1980 their world was turned upside down when Maria was diagnosed with cancer. Joe and Maria decided to pack up and move down to Houston, Texas for her treatment.

Joe transferred to Pasadena, Texas and began working for Shell's East Houston Terminal while Maria worked for the Phillips 66 Company in Pasadena as well. Together they would endure her 22 year long battle with cancer until his beloved wife passed away in 2002.
